At Perton Primary Academy we take very seriously our responsibility to prepare children for life in modern Britain. We value the ethnic backgrounds of all pupils and families and undertake a variety of events and lessons to celebrate and explore these, alongside other cultures in our country.

We ensure that the fundamental British Values are introduced, discussed and lived out through the ethos and work of the school. All curriculum areas provide a vehicle for furthering understanding of these concepts. We also follow a structured plan of learning for PSHE, RE and Picture News which ensures that all British values are discussed regularly.

The school makes considerable efforts to ensure children have exposure to a wide experience beyond their local community during which these concepts are shown, through for example, sporting events, a range of visits and use of outdoor education centres.

Their strong rooted values-based understanding gives them an excellent platform for embracing difference. At Perton, we value the voice of the child and promote democratic processes such as our school ambassadors whose members are voted for by the children. Ideas and events are planned and discussed with a chance for debate and putting forward points of view. We also have sports leaders and Eco Team Members as well as well-being leaders.

We expect all our children to be good role models for each other, which is encouraged through high expectations of behaviour. We use 'Proud to be Perton' to convey this to the children and this underpins our school ethos and behaviour policy. The Perton values are Proud, enthusiastic, respectful, thoughtful, open minded and nurturing.
